Tom G. Lewis, Sr., beloved husband and father, passed away on May 17, 2009, after a long illness. Mr. Lewis was born on July 19, 1916, in Bainbridge, Georgia, the youngest of six children, to the late Charles and Sallie Lewis. His family moved to Crowley, Louisiana, where Mr. Lewis grew up.

Mr. Lewis attended Louisiana State University from which he graduated with an engineering degree. He went to work in the oil business, first for Standard Oil then for Amoco. Although Mr. Lewis had arranged to serve in the U.S. Navy during World War II, he was deemed to be more important to the war effort as a result of his job in the oil industry. Mr. Lewis worked in a variety of positions, finally retiring as field superintendent of the Old Ocean Field in Hastings, Texas. In 1980, Mr. Lewis moved to Hide-a-Way Lake where he remained a resident until his death. Mr. Lewis, for many years, was an active Shriner, especially as member and supporter of the Sharon Temple Golf unit.

Mr. Lewis was preceded in death by his parents, his siblings, and his late first wife, Sylvia. He is survived by his wife of 33 years, Catherine Lewis; by his son, daughter and stepsons, Tom G. Lewis, Jr., Sylvia Rushing, Donald F. Killingsworth, and Alan Killingsworth and their respective spouses; by eight grandchildren, and three great-grandchildren. All of them will miss him greatly.

the Caudle-Rutledge Funeral Home in Lindale, Texas. The family requests
